Gardener's Corner

Help stop the emerald ash borer's spread in Southeastern Wisconsin



The latest news on the spread of emerald ash borer (EAB) is hitting closer and closer to home. As of September 2009, all four Southeastern Wisconsin counties have been placed under quarantine by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Protection.

What does that mean for you and me? As homeowners, nature advocates and outdoor enthusiasts, we need to keep our eyes open when we mow our lawn (think spring!), visit a park or go biking. Pay more attention to the ash trees near where you live and work.

Learn to ID an ash tree - Not sure what an ash tree looks like? This is the perfect opportunity to pick up a book on tree identification. With our infamously long and cold winters, you might need to find a tree book that includes photos or drawings of ash trees without leaves.

Get to know the bug - Find out when the emerald ash borer and their larvae are active. A typical life cycle for an ash borer begins in the spring. In May and June, adult females start laying eggs two weeks after they emerge. After the eggs hatch, the larvae will start tunneling into the ash tree bark looking for food. This feeding can begin in late July and last through October.

Do not move firewood - Did you know the emerald ash borer does not fly more than a few miles? So how did it get from Michigan to Wisconsin? We unknowingly helped it spread by moving firewood, logs and buying infested nursery stock.

It is a race against time. An estimated 50 million ash trees are dead or dying in the Midwest alone. The more we learn, the better equipped we are to prevent the spread. Ash trees will typically lose one-third of their top canopy within the first year of infestation. And if left untreated, the tree will die in two to four years.


